

The OC Parks Jr. Ranger Program encourages park guests to explore the outdoor world within OC Parks by developing a sense of belonging, becoming a part of nature and feeling empowered to be stewards of Orange County's natural and cultural resources.

The OC Parks Jr. Ranger Program includes 20 of OC Parks' amazing parks and historic sites throughout the County of Orange. The sites are divided into four geographic areas (north, south, east and west), with a separate activity booklet for each region.

- Complete the activities for each park to receive the park's unique Jr. Ranger badge.
- Earn badges from all five parks in the region and receive a Jr. Ranger vest.
- Earn all 20 OC Parks Jr. Ranger badges to receive the grand prize, a Jr. Ranger backpack!









Instructions

Step 1: To earn a park's Jr. Ranger badge, complete at least one "Anywhere Activity" and the specific pages for that park. Anywhere Activities can be done at any park location and are encouraged to be completed multiple times - it's a new experience each time! Additional copies of these activities can be downloaded at ocparks.com.

Step 2: Show your completed activities to staff or volunteers at the park office or nature center. They will administer the Jr. Ranger oath, sign off on your pages and present you with a park badge.

Step 3: Using this booklet, repeat steps 1 and 2 at each of the five locations in the selected region.

Step 4: To receive your south region prize, bring all five badges or your fully completed activity booklet to the Aliso and Wood Canyons Wilderness Park Visitor Center. Be sure to check current operating hours prior to your visit. Appointments are recommended by emailing ir.ranger@ocparks.com.

If you have already completed another regional activity booklet and have received your Jr. Ranger vest, congratulations! You're well on your way to receiving the grand prize!

Step 5: Once you have earned all 20 Jr. Ranger Program badges, bring them to OC Parks Headquarters located at Irvine Ranch Historic Park (13042 Old Myford Road, Irvine, CA 92602) to receive your grand prize. Appointments are required by emailing jr.ranger@ocparks.com.

A Note to Adults: You are strongly encouraged to let your learner take the lead on all activities. They are designed to promote curiosity and a sense of wonder. Getting correct answers is not nearly as important as having an immersive outdoor learning experience.


South Region Introduction

In the southern portion of Orange County, steep hills, coastal canyons and wilderness parks next to suburban communities dominate the landscape. Caspers, Riley, and Aliso and Wood Canyons wilderness parks all preserve precious natural space and are managed with habitat preservation in mind. Enjoy a day out on the trails and take in the immense natural beauty these parks have to offer, including an abundance of native plants and various wildlife that call these parks home. Laguna Niguel Regional Park has its fair share of wildlife too, especially when it comes to the waterfowl that visit the park and its 44-acre lake. Interested in learning more about local history? Heritage Hill Historical Park is just the place! With four fully restored and furnished historic buildings, Heritage Hill brings visitors back in time to explore Orange County's rich past.




Nature Journaling

Improve Your Observation

Nature journaling can be practiced in almost any space and can help create connections with the environment around us through focused observation.

Find an area within the park that you would like to observe and document. Spend 3-5 minutes in that location and pay attention to details you might otherwise overlook. Use your senses to focus on what you observed. What do you hear? What do you smell? What do you see?

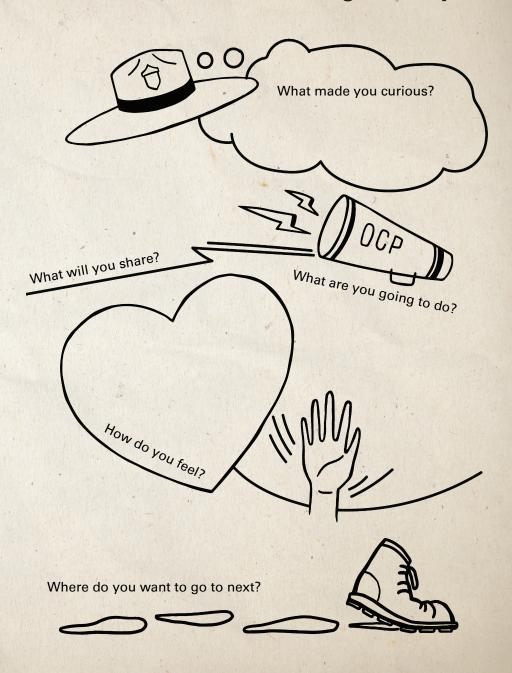
Park Protectors

Aliso and Wood Canyons Wilderness Park

Aliso and Wood Canyons Wilderness Park is a protected natural area nestled in a coastal canyon. Marine fog often rolls in and covers the park in mist and provides much needed moisture for diverse life to survive.

Using a pencil and the map below, stroll along the Wonderous Watershed Trail outside the visitor center to complete the activities. Use your senses to help you perceive and enjoy nature as butterflies, roadrunners and bobcats might. Imagine how many sounds and smells are out there!





Dripping Cave, located off Wood Canyon Trail, was once used as a temporary refuge by Indigenous people. Years later, the shelter was reportedly used by the infamous Flores-Daniel Gang aka Las Manillas as a hideout to rob the San Diego to Los Angeles stagecoach.





Touch: The rocks and fossils found here were once under an ancient sea. Run your hand over the rock and embedded fossils. Note the texture of your findings with an X on the scale below:

Caspers Wilderness Park

Inspect the Aspect

Spanning nearly 8,000 acres, Caspers Wilderness Park is the largest park in the OC Parks system. It boasts many different types of terrain and its valleys and canyons are home to lots of living things.

Steep slopes and varying degrees of sun exposure make canyons incredibly diverse habitats. Seasonal water runoff is collected in the form of streams and creeks in their low points, making them deeper each year.



Canyon slopes that face north tend to have denser vegetation because they are shaded longer throughout the day, allowing moisture to stay in the soil longer. Slopes that face south tend to have less vegetation as heat from the sun causes moisture to evaporate faster.




A slope's angle in relation to the sun is called aspect.

Heritage Hill Historical Park

Discover the Historic Saddleback Valley

Heritage Hill Historical Park features four historic buildings that represent distinct periods of Orange County history. The Serrano Adobe represents the Mexican Rancho era, El Toro Grammar School and St. George's Episcopal Mission highlight the founding of the town of El Toro, and the Harvey Bennett Ranch House embodies life during the agricultural boom at the turn of the 20th century.

Laguna Niguel Regional Park

Lakeside Birding Bingo

Rangers, researchers and enthusiasts identify birds for many reasons and Laguna Niguel Lake is an excellent spot for birding. The park has multiple habitats that support a variety of avian (bird) species.

Birding bingo is a fun way to identify and track the types of birds you see. Visit the lake in the southeast corner of the park and mark each bird you see on the board. Look UP to the sky, ACROSS into trees and DOWN into the lake.
