Mid 1860s

The partners acquire Rancho Lomas de Santiago.

Mid 1860s

Rancho San Joaquin is acquired by four prosperous sheep ranchers: Benjamin and Thomas Flint, Llewellyn Bixby and James Irvine.

Late 1870s

James Irvine becomes sole owner of the Ranchos by acquiring his partners' interests for \$150,000. His 109,000-acre ranch stretches 23 miles from the Santa Ana River to the Pacific Ocean.

1892

James Irvine II comes into full possession of the ranch and nearly doubles the size of the Irvine family residence.

1893

James Irvine II incorporates the ranch into the Irvine Company. Under his supervision, the ranch grows significantly and becomes a leading producer of beans, barley, sugar beets and oranges.

1968

The Irvine residence is demolished.

1965

A fire damages the Irvine residence.

2008

The Katie Wheeler Library building, a careful reproduction of the original Irvine residence, is completed.
